

University of New England Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) 2023 Allocation Report

The Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022 require higher education providers to provide a publicly available report on student services and amenities fee (SSAF) allocations and actual expenditure for the year as part of their annual reporting and in the form approved by the Minister. This SSAF Allocation Report is the form approved by the Minister.

Additional reporting was introduced to allow for greater transparency and consistency in SSAF allocations and expenditure.

Please note, the information provided in this *SSAF Allocation Report* does **not** require auditing by a financial accountant. The SSAF <u>expenditure reporting remains unchanged</u>, more information can be found in the <u>Financial Statements Guidelines</u> for Table A and B providers, and in the <u>Financial Viability Instructions: Applicants and Providers of FEE-HELP (FVI) for all other approved providers.</u>

SSAF Consultation and Achievements

UNE has a formal consultation process with students and their representative bodies to identify priorities for the allocation of funds generated by the student services and amenities fee. In 2023, UNE students received an invitation from the UNE Student Council to respond to a survey about the use of the SSAF. This survey was designed to identify student priorities, respond to individual student enquiries and make recommendations to the UNE SSAF Committee to prioritise SSAF expenditure. The 2023 SSAF Survey revealed that students believed the most important SSAF funded categories are:

- 1. Health & Welfare (14%)
- 2. Employment & Careers (13%)
- 3. Study Skills (11%)
- 4. Financial Affairs (8%)
- 5. Accommodation help (7%)
- 6. Advocating students' interests in matters arising from under the higher education provider's rules (6%)

The 2023 SSAF Survey responses also revealed the following SSAF funded activities which students currently access or use:

- 1. Studiosity (16%)
- 2. Online Orientation (16%)
- 3. Academic Skills Office (13%)
- 4. Discounts on On-Campus Cafes & Restaurants (9%)
- 5. SportUNE (8%)
- 6. UNE Night Shuttle (6%)

SSAF Charge Summary

The student services and amenities fee (SSAF) charged to students must not be above the maximum fee for a calendar year. The maximum SSAF is indexed annually as required by the *Higher Education Support Act 2003*. In 2023 the maximum SSAF was \$324.

UNE SSAF Charges are based on the following schedule:

¹ Note: As per Part 2 of the *Higher Education Support (Administration) Guidelines 2022* (Administration Guidelines), students studying on a part-time basis must not be charged more than 75 per cent of the maximum SSAF that a higher education provider determines for students studying on a full-time basis. The term "part-time basis" means a study load of less than 75 per cent of the normal full-time student load for the period to which the fee relates. As per part 7 of the Administration Guidelines, the normal EFTSL value for a full-time student studying over a period of one year is 1.0.

² Note: As per Part 2 of the Administration Guidelines, a higher education provider may choose to determine a different SSAF for particular categories of persons, including a zero amount.

³ Note: Students are categorised as full-time or part-time students based on the total EFTSL value of the units of study they undertook in 2023. For example, a student undertook a full-time study load in Semester 1 which was equal to 0.5 EFTSL and undertook a part-time study load in Semester 2 which was equal to 0.375 EFTSL. This student would be categorised as a full-time student in 2023 as the total EFTSL they undertook in 2023 was equal to 0.875.
